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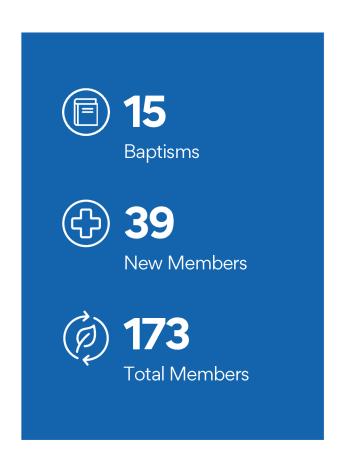
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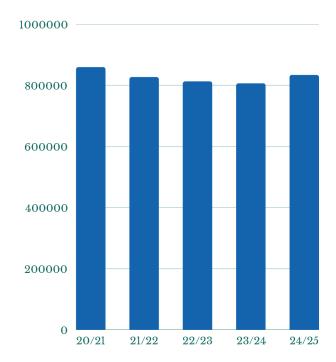

Next Steps Classes | Pastor Jarret and Pastor Johnny led several Next Steps Classes, resulting in 39 people making the commitment to be a member of First Baptist Downers Grove.

Believer's Baptisms | Baptisms were held: June, September, December, February, and March.

Staffing Changes | Mark Eakley stepped down as Worship Pastor in August 2024 after serving in the role for six years. Shari Peterson stepped down as Principal of Downers Grove Christian School after nearly 10 faithful years of service. Joshua Peel was hired as Principal in June 2024.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Church... What a year! My heart fills with immense joy and gratitude as I look back on this incredible first year in Downers Grove. To say that I have tasted and seen the goodness of God is an understatement. Our Lord has been so, so good to me, to Dakota, and to FBC.

As one of our beloved church members often reminds me, "When God does a thing, He does it well." Amen and amen. God has indeed done great things, let us echo with the Psalms – "Praise the Lord!" Thank you church, for the way you have loved and welcomed Dakota and I; we love being here!

There's so much to summarize in this first year, so I'll do my best! Among many roles of Lead Pastor, it has been a tremendous honor to preach God's Word. Last year, we worked through several series and books. My first sermon series was, "This is Us", where I preached our church's mission (to boldly proclaim the Gospel and motivate believers to maturity in Christ); our church's heart (know, grow, go); and our church's values (biblical, vibrant, loving).

If you're ever wondering what motivates any decisions, start with these statements. This is who we have been, who we are, and who we will continue to be! As Isaiah 40:8 says, "The grass withers and the flowers fade, but the Word of our God endures forever." I hope this first year has modeled what I will always seek to do: Preach the Word (2 Timothy 4:2).



Following the "This is Us" series, we walked through the book of Joshua, seeing the goodness of God as the Lord guided His people into the Promised Land. In the same way, I trust God is leading us still today, guiding us into His "promised land" for FBC.

As we ended Joshua, we did a mini-series called, "Choose to Serve", where we talked about our role as Christians to serve God by serving others. I am so grateful for the dozens of servant-hearted volunteers at FBC; we love you and are so thankful for you!

In Fall 2024, we jumped into Ephesians, where Paul encouraged the church to sit still, walk well, and stand strong. I love that during an election season, we were consistently anchored in the reminder that our unity is in Christ and Christ alone (Ephesians 2:11-22).

To wrap the calendar year, we centered on the Gospel of Matthew's emphasis of Christ being the fulfillment of prophecies, and the One who fulfills our hearts. In 2025, we started the year going through five books of the Bible (Obadiah, 2 John, 3 John, Philemon, Jude) in the series, "5 in 2025." My hope is that this motivated you to read through the remaining 61 books of the Bible! This Spring 2025, we returned to the Gospel of Matthew, examining what it means to Follow Jesus, seeing this as a commitment to go wherever, doing whatever, whenever! May this be the disposition we all have as we seek to follow our Lord Jesus.

One of this first year's many highlights is getting to know and work with the Deacon Board and Staff. They are incredible examples of godly servants and the secret sauce of what makes FBC so special. It has been an absolute joy to pray and labor together for the Kingdom of God.

In addition, I love the ministry of Downers Grove Christian School. It is abundantly clear to me that God is opening a wide door of effective ministry through our school, as we have seen several families come to FBC through DGCS!

I praise God when I see the growth God gave FBC this year. Scripture is clear that all growth is from God (1 Corinthians 3:6-7), and we should unapologetically praise God for the growth He is bringing about in our midst.

Let's praise God for seeing 48 first-time family units connect with FBC at the Connection Corner! Let's praise God for the 39 new church members who have put their stake in the ground to call FBC their church. Let's praise God celebrating 15 baptisms, as people are taking their next steps to follow Jesus! Let's praise God for the 12 groups that are growing to maturity in Christ! Let's praise God, for He is good, and He is worthy of all of our praise, always.

Lastly, I want to conclude with something I regularly ponder regarding the providence and faithfulness of God in our church's history. In 1851, a missionally-focused group of men and women gathered to establish a church in Downers Grove. Little did they know (but God knew), that nearly 175 years later, First Baptist Church of Downers Grove would still be standing strong on the cornerstone of Christ, at the corner of Maple and Washington.

I believe with all my heart that our mission now is the same mission, the Great Commission (Matthew 28:18-20; Acts 1:8). Jesus is commissioning us to go into the highways and byways of Downers Grove and the surrounding neighborhoods, prayerfully desiring to see people come to know Jesus, to help people grow in Jesus, and to be mobilized to go share Jesus, till there's no place left (Romans 15:23).

Church, let's continue to pursue the mission of God, together!

DEACON BOARD

The Deacon Board stands firmly on the Biblical foundation we have trusted over many years: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight."

Indeed, that sums up the year as the Lord led Jarret Garber to serve as First Baptist Church's Lead Pastor. Pastor Jarret joined the Deacon Board as a voting member immediately after his arrival on March 25 and quickly learned the Deacons' means and methods as well as all of FBC's.

We thank the Lord for His provision in bringing Jarret to serve in the role of shepherding FBC. The Lord has been true to His word, as He led us through many complex challenges and made straight our paths culminating in Him delivering a Lead Pastor. Thank you, Lord!

The FBC Constitution outlines the role of the Deacon Board as follows:

The Deacon Board, as the elected representatives of the congregation, shall have oversight of all the members, committees, and organizations inside the First Baptist Church and of relationships with other churches and organizations outside the church. The Deacon Board shall have supervision over all legal and fiscal affairs of the church.



Toward that end, the board met twice monthly to, first and foremost, pray for church members and other items affecting the health and welfare of the church and its ministries. The board also discussed a wide variety of issues germane to the activities of the staff, committees, the building, and the congregation. A snapshot of some of the board's activities include:

- Planned and implemented a commissioning service for Pastor Jarret on Sunday, April 14, where the Deacons prayed over him as he started his ministry at FBC.
- Reviewed the sermon focus for Sunday services, which included:
 - "This Is Us" series on our mission, heart, and values as a church
 - June the Book of Joshua
 - August-November Ephesians
 - December Christmas Fulfilled
- A FBC Benevolence Policy was prepared to help direct those in need of resources to meet immediate needs and to outline the process for requesting financial support.

- Discussed and finalized a visitor pipeline process, highlighting the following touchpoints:
 - Contact info acquisition
 - Opportunities for growth (groups)
 - New Member's Class/Next Steps
 - Opportunities to serve
 - Opportunities for connection
 - Contribute to the church's mission
- FBC said goodbye to Mark and Colleen Eakley as they transitioned to a music minister role in Ohio.
- Pastor Jarret and the Deacons compiled a musician lineup to serve during the music director search.
- The title and role of a replacement for Mark was discussed. Two primary expectations of the role will be leading Sunday worship and leading our small group ministry.
- Pastor Jarret and the Deacons began the search for a new music director.
 Pastor Jarret networked with various colleges and local contacts.
- The sanctuary projector broke, and replacing it in kind was not desired. A semi-permanent solution was implemented using two large TVs. Deacons discussed a permanent solution with Trustees and Staff.
- Dash Apartments was sold by Opus (developer) to Nuveen (commercial real estate company). The new owner, in accordance with provisions in the original agreement, asked FBC to sign a statement and evaluate an addendum regarding the parking areas at Dash.

- The FBC Employee Handbook was reviewed and revised in its entirety to reassess items such as holidays, sick leave, bereavement, etc.
- An evaluation of FBC's and DGCS' health care plan was undertaken to review premium costs and other healthcare policy features.
- Over the course of the year, the board:
 - Participated in Next Steps Classes and heard testimonies from all new members
 - Oversaw FBC's committees and met with committee chairs
 - Reviewed and approved FBC's annual budget
 - Reviewed and approved all committee nominations
- The board initiated a discussion of committee structure and put some measures in place for 2025/26.
- The Board approved to retain Jennifer Guo during the next fiscal year to work with Children's Ministries and DGCS. She will be living in Parsonage No. 2.
- A new 10-week Sunday Adult Class was created, focusing on the foundations of the church. This class can be held as needed to meet the needs of the growing number of new believers and members.
- The board continues to review FBC's security provisions for Sunday services to keep them current and effective.

These are highlights of a remarkably busy and, thankfully, very fruitful year that has seen the Lord lead and bless FBC in so many ways. We are very thankful to see many new people attending and rejoiced as many were baptized and became members. Indeed, the Deacon Board has a deep, heartfelt praise for the Lord and is so thankful for all He has done!

Year in Summary

It has been an exciting year! With the help of many wonderful volunteers, special events like Family Craft Night and VBS were successful and had many discipleship opportunities for children, volunteers, and parents. Children also took part in weekly programs like Sunday School and Children's Church and Awana on Wednesdays. I am thankful for all our volunteers who served during such a busy year.

Our goal was to focus on families by helping children and parents grow as believers. We believe parents are the primary disciplers, so we encouraged and equipped them with resources to disciple their children.



Sunday Mornings

It is awesome how the Lord has blessed us with the number of kids coming to church on Sunday morning. Many of the new kids coming are ones we see throughout the week at DGCS. This is a great opportunity for us to get to know new families! We are also using both sides of the nursery due to the growth and to welcome babies arriving soon!

Lastly, moving to the second floor has made a significant positive impact. Many parents love knowing their children are learning God's Word in a safe environment.

Awana

Many members engaged kids to help know and grow in the Lord. From verse time and small groups to learning a new Bible story or Scripture passage, many kids learned about Jesus consistently.

Awards Night was a wonderful time to reflect not only on finishing a book, but also the many passages of scripture that are now hidden in each heart. Kids celebrated the end of the Awana year with a carnival.

Vacation Bible School

The theme for VBS was Scuba: Diving Into Friendship With God. Many families attended church the following Sunday to sing a song they learned at VBS.

Each year, VBS has been the largest outreach for children's ministry, with many local families coming to hear the Good News of Jesus Christ. A total of 119 different children attended VBS.

Our Friday Night program highlights included: singing, gospel presentation, and ice cream social. It was great to see members engaged in conversations with many parents.

We also collected offering throughout the week for one of our missionaries in India/Nepal. The kids were divided in two teams - the Sharks and the Dolphins. Both teams did an amazing job raising money for missions!

We capped off the night with our wonderful new Lead Pastor (and later, me) receiving a whipped cream pie to the face.

Family Craft Night

During the Christmas season, we host Family Craft Night, an opportunity for a child to make crafts for themselves or give to a loved one.

This event grows in number each year and includes many people who do not attend our church. This is a great opportunity for people to see who we are as a church in a relaxed environment.



Children's Ministry Intern

In the beginning of May, we were blessed to have Jennifer Guo join our staff as Children's Ministry Intern. It has been a blessing to the church to have such a wonderful young leader help with the children and continue to learn the skills she needs for the future.

Every Sunday morning and Wednesday night, she has taken the lead on many leadership opportunities. It is awesome to see her grow in Christ and to guide her in the direction He wants her to go.

A lot of time, effort, and energy went into this ministry year. It could not have been done without the many, many volunteers who helped on a weekly basis. I want to say thank you to all who helped set a godly example of what it is to be a Christian.

YOUTH MINISTRIES



It has been a tremendous blessing to witness God's work in Grove Students this year. Our students continue to grow in their faith and commitment to Christ through our various programs, trips, and discipleship opportunities. As I reflect on this year's journey, I am filled with gratitude for how the Lord has moved in the hearts of our students.

As a ministry, we are committed to creating an environment where students become disciples who KNOW Jesus, GROW in Jesus, and then GO and take the gospel message to a world that needs it. Our strategy focuses on engaging, equipping, and empowering students to love God and others wholeheartedly.

Our Wednesday night youth group remains our cornerstone of discipleship. Each week, students gather for a time of musical worship, prayer, Scripture reading and teaching, small group discussion, and games.

This consistent rhythm has provided students with stability and growth in their faith journeys. Providing space to ask questions and grow in Christ together has been extremely valuable for our students' development.

Last June, we had the privilege of going to D3 Camp in Louisville, Kentucky. This week-long experience challenged students through in-depth Bible teaching, worship, and fellowship.

Many returned with renewed commitments to Scripture study and prayer. The spiritual growth evident in our students following this trip has been remarkable, with several now taking more active leadership roles both inside and outside our church walls.

Our Fall service trip to Camp TimberLee provided hands-on opportunities to serve others while building community. Students worked together on various maintenance and improvement projects around the camp, learning valuable lessons about teamwork and sacrificial service. We studied the fulfillment of Christ as the Prophet and enjoyed activities, while deepening friendships and strengthening community.

There are various touchpoints in place for students to invite friends so many can come and experience our community, such as our April Lock-In.

A more recent example was our Ski Trip in February, a highlight for many students. Beyond the excitement of skiing and snowboarding, this trip created natural opportunities for meaningful conversations about faith and life.

The Lock-In and Ski Trip create a bridge for students not currently involved in church to experience the community we share.

I have been particularly encouraged by the increasing number of students serving in various capacities throughout our church. Several students have joined the Tech Team, operating sound, ProPresenter, and lighting systems during Sunday services.

Others are serving in Children's Ministry and some are serving with our Wednesday night Worship Team. These service opportunities allow students to discover and develop their spiritual gifts while becoming more integrated into the broader church family.

As we look toward the coming year, we remain committed to creating pathways for students to deepen their relationship with Christ and with one another. We are profoundly grateful for the prayers, support, and involvement of our church family in the lives of these students.

CHRISTIAN SCHOOL

Spiritual Highlights

- This school year our theme is God is Love and our theme verse is 1 John 4:7-8: "Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love." The focus of chapel was to learn what it looks like to show love to others. Each month, we focused on "one another" passages scripture which emphasize love for God and love for others. Examples include: Serve One Another, Accept One Another, Bear with One Another, and Encourage One Another.
- Various chapel speakers challenged our students to know and understand the meaning of these statements and how that can impact our understanding of who Jesus is and how much He loves and cares for us.
- Buddy Chapel: Every student has a chapel buddy they sit next to, pray with, and encourage. These buddy chapels occurred several times throughout the year and encouraged students to share their faith and participate in active disciple-making.
- Teachers were challenged and encouraged in their spiritual life by having weekly staff meetings. Friday mornings were devoted to a time of prayer for our school families, alumni, and prayer requests shared by staff.



- Operation Christmas Child: DGCS partnered with FBC to collect 250 boxes that ministered to children all over the world, not only with material gifts, but also with the message of hope and salvation through Jesus Christ.
- Feed My Starving Children
- The Christmas musical, Spring musical, and Art Showcase which demonstrates the many talents of our DGCS students.
- A consistent and deliberate effort of Biblical Integration continues in all classrooms. Teachers continue to make purposeful connections to Biblical truths and lessons whenever they have the opportunity to do so.
- The Pastor Appreciation Chapel and luncheon was attended by 25+ pastors from local congregations.

DGCS continues to strive for academic excellence – for every child – and highlights from this year are below:

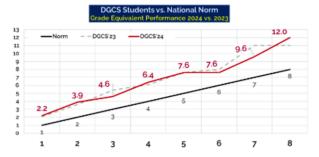

Hospital & Wellness Visits | Various visits were made to those in the hospital and recuperating at home.

Communion | We prepared communion trays and assisted in distribution on Communion Sundays.

Meal Train | Meals were provided in times of sickness, surgery recovery, birth, and loss of a family member. This ministry is supported via a website in which individuals volunteer to provide a meal for a family. It has been an active year and will continue in the future.

Women's Bible Studies | Four women's Bible studies met throughout the year. Babysitting was provided for the Wednesday morning study.

Book Club | Book Club met six times and includes a core group of ladies. This group plans to meet in the summer and throughout next year.

Christmas Bags | 31 bags filled with snacks, treats, and useful items were distributed to our widows, widowers, and homebound families in November.

Bridal & Baby Showers | We were blessed to host one bridal shower and one baby sprinkle. We are planning several more bridal, baby sprinkle, and baby showers in 2025. It is a pleasure to show love and care for new couples and new parents in this way.

Moms in Prayer | Six women, on average, met on Tuesday evenings at church or in homes to pray for children and schools.

GLOBAL OUTREACH
